Dimensioning Notes

Dimension Lines

- 1. Dimension lines are thin, black, solid lines that show where a dimension <u>begins</u> and <u>ends</u>
- 2. Draw them parallel to the surface or edge being described.
- 3. Break the dimension line to allow room for the <u>number</u> to be written.

Extension Lines

- 1. Extension lines are used to <u>extend</u> the lines on a view to show were dimension lines start and end.
- 2. Place them outside the view beginning about 1/16th inch away from the view
- 3. Make sure it doesn't touch the object, unless it's a <u>circle</u>.

Arrow Heads

- 1. Arrowheads show the beginning and end of a dimension line.
- 2. Start drawing the arrow at the <u>extension</u> line, close to the dimension line.

Leader

- 1. Leaders are thin lines used to direct dimensions, notes, or symbols to the intended place on a drawing.
- 2. Use an <u>arrowhead</u> at the end of a leader.
- 3. If a leader points to a surface, use a <u>dot</u> instead of an arrowhead.
